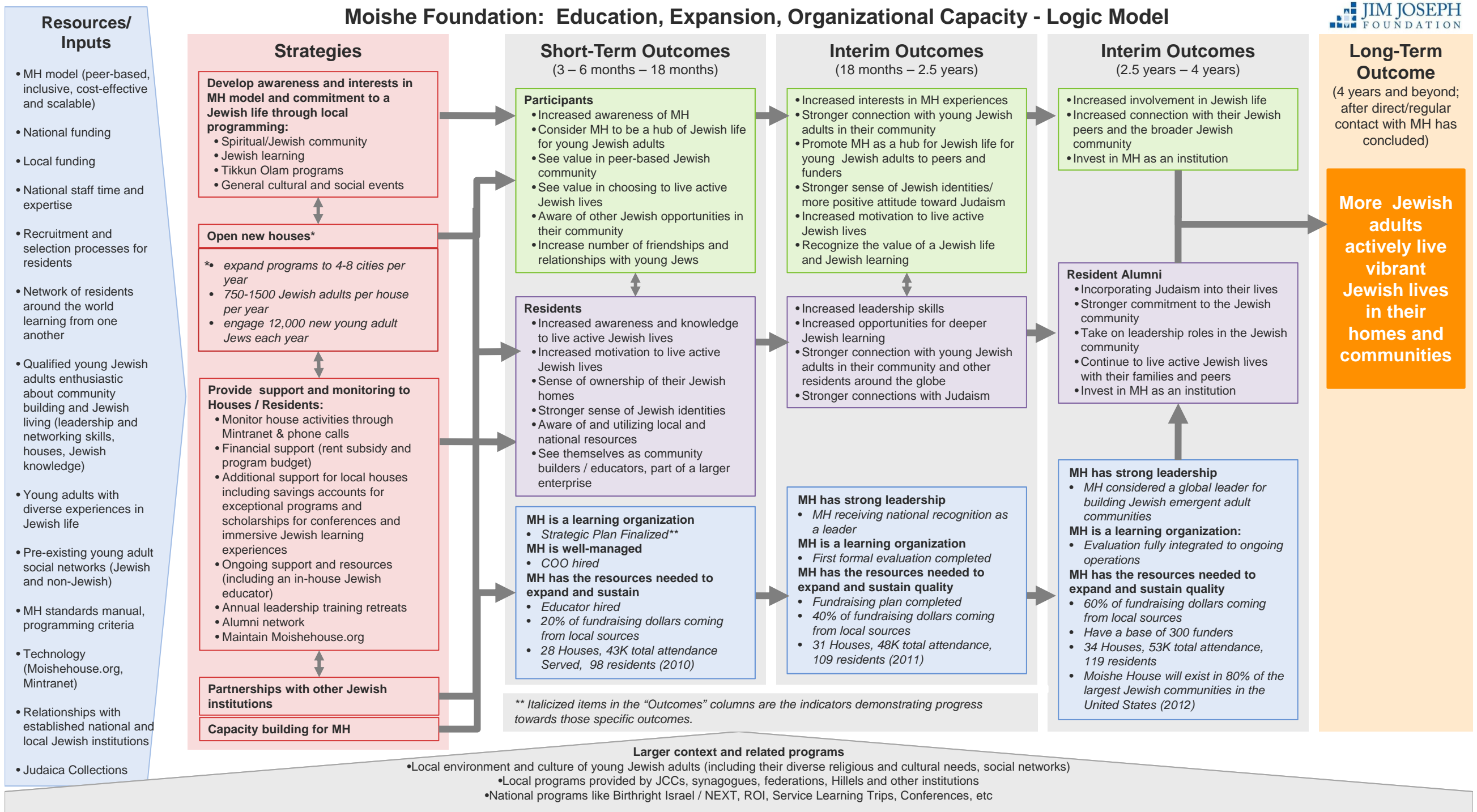


Moishe Foundation: Education, Expansion, Organizational Capacity - Logic Model



Key Assumptions

- There is an unmet demand among Jewish young adults in cities around the world for opportunities to meet Jewish peers and engage with them at Jewish programs.
- Young adults are interested and will continue to be interested in building home-based Jewish communities for their peers.
- Modest **financial** incentives and support increase their **ability** to commit to this work and the amount of time they are willing to give to it.
- Young adults already are living with housemates after college and own computers, digital cameras, etc.
- Young adults are defined loosely as 22-30 years old.
- Ongoing participation in a mix of educational, cultural and social Jewish programming led by young adult peers will lead to young adult participants engaging in ongoing Jewish learning and choosing to live Jewish lives.
- Many young adults have the necessary skills to lead such programs, and those who don't can be trained to do so successfully through a combination of on-the-job learning and semi-annual retreats.
